# **STEM Program and Lab Moving Forward**

This summer, we begin filling out our new STEM lab with equipment and furnishings! A team that includes Mr. Ridder, teachers and board members has been meeting this semester to plan for the addition of the STEM program at Isaac Newton.

Facilitated by a donor gift of \$92,000, the team is working on curriculum enhancement, training, equipment purchases, lab design and furnishings.

Larry Shonk, our secondary Science teacher, has already used the Vernier LabQuest system in classes.

"We used Vernier probe ware when students made predictive statements of how different colors absorb light. The temperature sensors were used to track and chart temperature change over time. They entered the collected data directly to their Chromebooks for each trial and then incorporated the graphs into their final lab reports." The Science lab will also need a vent hood to the outside, a chemical and eye shower, and other upgrades to accommodate a chemistry program in the fall.

The bulk of the gift will be spent on the STEM program, as the Academy pulls together the disciplines of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math.

"A visit to a STEM lab at a Christian school in the south this past winter helped me gain a clearer vision and become even more excited about our new lab," Technology Facilitator Kristi Nanke explained. "Almost daily, through emails and online technology page posts, I learn more about the limitless possibilities for integrating STEM lessons into existing curriculum. Just this morning, we were able to have a Grant Wood AEA representative share STEM resources with the faculty that will make this integration process a smooth one. I can't wait to see the lab and lessons in action next year. What a blessing to our school!"

Seventh grade students used new microscope cameras in a recent experiment on pond water. "Students collected samples of pond water near their homes," explained Science teacher, Mr. Larry Shonk. "They then monitored microscopic organisms over time and used the cameras to capture images of what they were seeing. The students then uploaded the pictures and merged them into their final lab reports."

## Scholars Campaign Update

In May, Isaac Newton Christian Academy received a \$187,000 gift to be used toward finishing out the Activity Center! This major gift puts us within reach of that goal.

The Activity Center is always a busy place, whether our students are using it for physical education classes, home practices and games, or whether a ministry, church or community organization is using it after hours!

According to ISHAA Rules, we can only have home games for high school sports if we provide locker rooms for both our students and visitors. Plans to finish the Activity enter include men's and women's locker rooms, a weight/conditioning room, and athletic director/coaches offices.

"We will also put in a mezzanine level above that area, providing room for two additional classrooms as well as more storage," explained Josh Davis, Board President. "We are working on the projected cost to complete the project, and we and will have a remaining fundraising target for next year."
