
environment where every student feels known, valued, and challenged to reach their God-given potential.

It is quite amazing the difference that hope can make. Hope can draw the weak to strengthen their shaking knees, it can cause people to wait in lines outside for days in hopeful expectation for the next big thing, it can cause a student to work harder than they ever thought possible in hope for a better future. Hope can even be the difference between life and death (Job 17, 2 Corinthians 1:8-11, Jonah 2, Matthew 27:3-5).

The Lord has often made use of 'hope,' as a simple, yet essential, lifeline for His people throughout the history He has written. We read of God's first promise of hope in Genesis 3 immediately after the fall of man in what is known as the Protoevangelium: "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel." Though all of mankind has just been plunged into sin, sickness, sorrow, and shame, God promises that there is hope for a day when all will be made

right (also Romans 8:22-25). We see throughout scripture the significance that the Lord puts on setting one's hope where it belongs and living in the light of that hopeful expectation (Isaiah 40:31, Psalm 146:5, Hebrews 10:23, 1 Peter 1:3, Titus 2:13).

Often hope can make all the difference between someone's experience even in suffering or trials. One of my favorite quotes from Paul David Tripp's book entitled *Suffering*, states a similar sentiment this way: "You never just suffer the thing that you're suffering, but you always also suffer the way that you're suffering that thing." When someone's hope is set to find joy in the Lord and His glory, even suffering can bring joy and sanctification (Acts 5:41, Romans 5:3, 2 Corinthians 4:16-18, 12:10, James 1:2).

This school year is a gracious gift from a Good Father and my prayer for every student, parent, faculty, and staff would be that their hope might be set this year to find joy in knowing and growing in love for the Lord on the campus of Isaac Newton Christian Academy and into the larger community of Cedar Rapids. I am satisfied to trust that the Lord will use this year in the lives of His people, for His glory and their good (Romans 8:28-30, 11:36). Perhaps you are stressed, or perhaps you are excited for the school year to come; maybe you are frustrated by changes, or perhaps you are grateful to be able to call Isaac Newton your child's school. 

More Paths to Academic Excellence

Entering a new school year is often marked by hope and excitement. We hope for what is new — new school supplies, outfits, and classes. We find comfort in what is familiar — returning to regular rhythms and schedules, athletics, and friends. While the expectations for a new school year start to build in August for our students, our leadership team dives in a bit sooner.

A New Upper School Schedule

Last spring, our Upper School staff began to plan for ways to reevaluate the students' schedule, based on student concern of not having enough capacity within the school day to focus on one subject at a time. Because we value academic excellence and our students' ability to pursue it, we wanted to come up with a solution that would uphold the standards of our mission and equip our students to spend more focused time in each subject. The fruit of that planning is a new schedule that reduces the number of subjects in a day, AND increases class time in each subject, without reducing the amount of content that is covered. This schedule change will also reduce the amount of daily homework by 25%. I am looking forward to seeing how our students benefit from this change.

Enhanced Communication

Isaac Newton Christian Academy students thrive off of what we call the home-school connection. We know that a student's success is highly contingent upon both the home and school working together. One way we accomplish this mission is by providing pathways for parents to easily access their student's progress. As a student progresses through our school, we also encourage them to become independent learners — taking personal responsibility for their academic achievements. Now, with the implementation of Canvas, a digital learning management system, our families will be able to see exactly what their 6th-12th grade student(s) are working on and see the areas in which they might need support.

Opportunities for Professional Development

At Isaac Newton, we charge our faculty with the task of being a Living Curriculum. They are mindful that they instruct not only rational explanations of formal subject material, but even more powerfully, through word, deed, example, and shared experience. One way our teachers will act as a living curriculum is through participation in Christian Professional Learning groups (CPLC's). These learning groups will require teachers to create individual professional development goals and report on their progress through their Profession Learning Journeys (PLJ's). I cannot wait to see how their participation in these CPLC's and PLJ's will impact the classroom, and ultimately, their hearts and minds as they grow deeper in and through Jesus.
